Alarm Permits What you need to know

If you live within the Fort Worth City limits and have a Monitored Home or Business Alarm System, you are required to obtain an Alarm Permit (Chapter 12 Fort Worth city Code)

Permits must be <u>renewed annually</u>. The Planning and Development Department will send out reminder notices, either by email or Postal Mail, about one month prior to the permit expiration date.

However, you are responsible for ensuring that you renew your permit.

To apply for or renew the Alarm Permit.

⇒ Online: Go to http://www.crywolfservices.com/fortworthtx

and select "Register Online" or if you have an existing Account just log in.

Applying or renewing Online is very easy. For first timers, you will need to register first and establish an account. Once you are registered, you can then apply for the permit.

Before applying for the Alarm Permit, make sure you have your paperwork from your Alarm Service. There is information that will be required for the permit process. Make sure you fully complete the application process, including paying online.

After you complete the application process, you will receive an email that confirms the application has been received. Once it is approved, you will receive your Alarm Permit information. This process is actually pretty quick. Make note of your Alarm Permit number—You will need this when you renew your permit. You can also always access your account and obtain this information.

Permit and Service Fees

Homeowner Permit Fee: \$50.00 initial and Annually **Commercial Permit Fee:** \$100.00 initial and Annually

False Alarms

1-3 false alarms in 12 months - No Charge

4-5 false alarms in 12 months - \$50 per call

6-7 false alarms in 12 months - \$75 per call

8 or more false alarms in 12 months - \$100 per call

The Chief or authorized designee shall refuse police response to any alarm notification from an alarm site that does not have a valid alarm permit unless the alarm notification is a duress alarm, a hold-up alarm, a panic alarm or a report to 911 emergency telephone or to the police department by a person other than an alarm company.

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Citizens on Patrol

History

On October 15, 1991, 105 persons representing eleven neighborhoods attended a twelve-hour training session at the Fort Worth Police Academy. The training was conducted for three hours per night over a four-night period covering legal liabilities, patrol procedures, communications, and the penal code.

No one anticipated how successful the Citizens on Patrol Program would be. The program has been credited with being a primary factor in decreases in Part I Crimes especially those of theft, burglary, and auto theft. It also has served as a catalyst in strengthening neighborhoods, and remains in an expansion mode.

Advanced training has been instituted at the Field Operations Divisions and the department has an annual recognition luncheon for all COPS members and their families. Finally, they have provided general support services to the neighbors in the area to which they are assigned, ranging from trash pick-ups to encouragement of persons to move into their area.

Today

The Citizens on Patrol Program is making a positive impact on Fort Worth's quality of life. Members help to deter crime by patrolling in their cars, on bicycles, and on foot patrol.



WHAT IS CRIME STOPPERS

Crime Stoppers began in Albuquerque, New Mexico in September 1976 when concerned citizens joined with local media and law enforcement in an effort to help curb crime. Individuals calling with information leading to the arrest of a person or persons involved in felony offenses were paid a cash reward. To preserve program integrity, informants were never required to give their names.

The Crime Stoppers program has enjoyed tremendous success, boasting an average conviction rate of 95% on cases solved by Crime Stoppers' tips. Today, there are more than 1,200 Crime Stoppers programs in the United States, Canada, United Kingdom, Australia, South Africa, Central America, and the Caribbean. Collectively, these programs have solved more than half a million crimes, and recovered about \$7 billion in stolen property and narcotics worldwide.

In this same tradition, Crime Stoppers of Tarrant County utilizes information from anonymous tipsters to arrest felony offenders. Since its inception in 1982 in Tarrant County, Crime Stoppers has paid more than \$3 million in rewards and recovered over \$36.5 million in property and narcotics. Additionally, over 14,447 offenders have been

HOW DOES CRIME STOPPERS WORK?

All tips submitted through the Crime Stoppers of Tarrant County hotline, online forms, live chat, and/or mobile apps are sent to the Crime Stoppers of Tarrant County Call Center. The call center is staffed by off-duty public safety dispatchers and other trained personnel, who take calls and online submissions and then disseminate the tip information to the appropriate law enforcement agency for investigation. Each caller will receive a tip number to be used in all future correspondence. Every tipster remains ANONYMOUS; callers do not have to identify themselves. A reward of up to \$1,000 will be offered to anyone who provides a tip that leads to an arrest for a crime or a criminal case cleared.

This created a bit of a challenge affecting our Crimewatch Signs. But a remedy was soon in place without needing to remake thousands of signs with the correct prefix.


Our East Division NPOs did an **OUTSTANDING JOB** applying reflective stickers with the correct Non Emergency number.

Crime Free Multi-Housing



Ordinance 19998-12-2011

Brief Description

The Crime Free Multi-Housing Program is a, state-of-the-art, crime prevention program designed to reduce crime, drugs, and gangs on apartment properties.

The program consists of **3 phases** that must be completed under the supervision of Fort Worth Police Department. Property Managers, Assistant Managers, and Leasing Agents can become individually certified after completing training and the property becomes certified upon successful completion of all three phases.

This certification usually expires every year unless renewed following compliance with Phases I (refresher training), II & III.

Who

Property Managers, Assistant Managers, and Leasing Agents authorized to show an apartment or execute a lease with prospective tenants in a complex with 8 or more units must attend an 8 hour training within 6 months of hire date. As well as the landlord or at least 1 employee from the complex shall attend a 4-hour refresher training annually.

Benefits

The anticipated benefits are reduced police calls for service, a safer plus more stable resident base, and reduced exposure to civil liability. Fully certified properties have reported reductions in police calls for service up to 70% over previous years. The heart and soul of the program is in the correct implementation and use of the Crime Free Lease Addendum.

- Increased demand for rental units with a reputation for active management
- Lower maintenance and repair costs
- Increased property values
- Improved personal safety for tenants, landlords, and managers



The City of Fort Worth is partnering with Deaf Link to provide the Accessible Hazard Alert System (AHAS) which will send accessible alert messages to registered residents who are Deaf,

Blind, Hard of Hearing, or Deaf/Blind before, during, and after an emergency or disaster in the City of Fort Worth.

Fort Worth AHAS subscribers in an area affected by an emergency or disaster will be able to receive an accessible alert message in American Sign Language (ASL) and English voice and text. The alert message could include information about the emergency and what actions to take.

Fort Worth AHAS will send accessible alert messages to internet and video capable devices such as computers, cell phones, smart phones, tablet computers, and wireless Braille readers.
