

Burglary of motor vehicle remains an issue with all of the motor vehicle burglaries this month being unlocked vehicles. We had 2 auto thefts this month but no established pattern. Neither beat had any violent or aggravated offenses during June.

F14 and F15 have an increase in violent crime with 3 reported aggravated assault offensives. 2 reported burglary of businesses with one being a school. Construction equipment theft is a continuous problem for the new builds in the Sendera Ranch and Madero neighborhoods. We have a total of 4 reported burglary of motor vehicles all from unlocked vehicles. Catalytic converter thefts are down with only 1 being reported and 2 auto thefts for the area. For the month of June I participated in career day presentation for the Xplor day care in Sendera Ranch. I along with SRO Alvarez participated in career day at JC Thompson Elementary and also did a presentation for the Spanish speaking kids enrolled in the summer bilingual program. Crime during June 2023 for F17 beat was low. The bulk of the offenses that were reported were located in the Presidio Towne Crossing. There was only 4 Burglary of Motor Vehicles for the entire month of June and the vast majority of Part 1 crimes was theft under \$100 to include shoplifting. Many of the beat road construction projects have come to an end and this has dramatically reduced the road rage incidents. DR Horton cleaned out their property along the SB Service road between Basswood and Western Center and the results have dramatically reduced homeless crimes in the area.





How to Report a Crime that Occurs in Fort Worth

Residents have various options to report crimes and suspicious activity to police. These online reports are those that do not require emergency assistance. To determine what calls can be submitted first determine;:

- This is not an Emergency?
- This incident occurred within the Fort Worth Police Department City limits?
- This did not occur on a State Freeway?

If the answer is "yes" to all 3 then one can proceed with making a report online. Using this online system allows a resident to submit and print a copy of the report all free of charge. It is easy to access and user friendly. Remember, there are other options to consider when needing to make a non-emergency report to police

Once the report is made the user will

- Receive notification telling them the report is completed
- Receive a police report case number
- Have the option to print off the report for personal records

Remember that filing a false report is considered a crime.

Neighborhood Involvement = Neighborhood Safety

Neighborhoods busy with outdoor activity; day/night hrs such as group walking, yard work activity, neighborhood get-togethers, bicycling, or other neighborhood interaction results in more people becoming aware to what is occurring outside their homes.

Neighborhood bonding, while simple to establish is not always recognized in value to establishing safer neighborhoods. There is not 1 program offered by the FWPD that can eradicate all acts of crime from occurring but there is 1 important element that can greatly aid in the reduction of crime and that is neighborhood involvement. Neighborhood Crime Watch encourages residents to work collaboratively with NPOs & Crime Prevention Specialists in the reduction of crime by organizing, identifying neighborhood needs and working towards safer neighborhoods. NCW training is offered to residents interested in finding out ways of becoming involved in their community & through FWPD crime prevention programs.

Businesses Active in Crime Watch



Some residents see something and wish something would be done while others see something and take action. Recently store managers and business owners at the Fossil Creek Shopping Plaza were contacted concerning the level of homelessness activity observed in the area.

Realizing that most of the businesses acknowledged there was a problem but did not know what they could do this volunteer put all her concerns down and emailed them-to me. After reading all her concerns a meeting date was scheduled and the rest is history. City representatives including Neighborhood Patrol Officers met and discussed options store managers and business owners could take in order to discourage this type of activity from continuing in and around their place of employment improving the safety for all employees and customers. The FWPD HOPE unit locates homeless persons explaining city and state laws and attempts to help with available resources. All homeless camps are to be reported using the MyFortWorth app https://www.fortworthtexas.gov/departments/communications/customercare/myfw







This is a project still in progress. Homelessness is rampant throughout the city and the nation. However, knowing who to contact to report abandoned campsites and importance of cleaning up nearby green spaces, by involving their Neighborhood Patrol officers & working closely with Crime Prevention Specialists, these owners & store managers have a better understanding on how to improve the situation.
