My name is Rodney Sneed and I am the Ed District Neighborhood Patrol Officer supervisor. I have been with the department almost 20 years. I have served in patrol as an officer and a sergeant. I was a North Division NPO from 2009 through 2012. After promoting to sergeant, I was assigned to patrol in East Division, Central Division, and finally, North Division. I have been serving as the Ed District NPO sergeant for just over a year. Ed district consists of a good ratio of residential and commercial property. The group of officers serving Ed district is outstanding, they range in tenure from about 9 years to over 25 years. The most common crimes in Ed district are burglary of motor vehicles, and the majority of these involve unlocked vehicle. Please take high value items out of your vehicle and lock your vehicle.

Violent and Property crime in August were very low. Two violent crimes not related to family violence were reported. The reported murder was domestic related murder / suicide. The robbery involved a stabbing and the suspect was identified and arrested. There were 18 property crimes reported. There were only two car burglaries, one home burglaries, two building burglaries and three auto thefts. The remaining property crimes were simple thefts. Most of the crime reported occurred in the southern portion of the beat between Western Center and Basswood Blvd. Code Blue patrols continue to help with the downward trend in crime on my beat.

There were 18 reported part 1 crimes in E13 beat that were not domestic related in the month of August. Two violent crimes included a sexual assault and aggravated robbery. The robbery occurred when the victim met up with the suspect to purchase a watch that was posted on Facebook. The victim identified the watch as fake and she suspect pulled a gun on him and stole his money. There were four reported home burglaries in the Park Glen neighborhood. There were also two building burglaries and four car burglaries. All four vehicles were left unlocked by the victims. The remaining property crimes were thefts. Two of them were reported thefts of a firearm and one catalytic converter. All extra patrols by our Code Blue folks is always appreciated

E14's beat had a significant decrease for the month of August in both the burglary of motor vehicles and auto thefts. I attribute this month's crime stats to the continued success of our patrol officers and COP's working together.

F-11 by NPO Barry Sawyer 817-994-3453 Last month we had a couple of incidents regarding a Robbery and an Aggravated Assault with a Deadly Weapon that occurred on separate days of the month; however, the subjects involved are the same individuals in both offenses. Officers were quick to respond to the 7-11 Robbery call and were able to apprehend two of the suspect in the neighboring community and positively identify the others that managed to get away that night. Warrant on all four subjects involved were issued and arrest were made. Approximately a week to two weeks later one of the suspects was attempting to purchase illegal drugs through a mobile app and possessing a gun and when he confronted the drug dealer he was shot. The subject was transported to the hospital for his injuries. There are no trending offenses that have occurred on the beat to report on at this time. NNO is coming up and we hope the community will get out and get to know your neighbors.

F-12 & F-13 by NPO John Martin (filling in for T Gonzalez)

In August, F12 experienced a small spike in total offenses reported, 42, compared to 32 total in July. The jump was driven mostly by domestic disturbance related assaults. Three were reported in July compared to eight in August. Motor vehicle thefts and motor vehicle burglaries stayed the same compared to July. No specific crime trends were identified in F12 for August. In F13 we had 14 offenses reported in August compared to 16 in July. No crime trend was identified for this time period. One theft of property and one home burglary were reported. Continue this good effort. One area of concern with traffic is motor vehicle crashes occurring in the 114 corridor west of Northwest High School. This area has experienced tremendous growth. Maintain safe distance when driving and stay off cell phones. This along with following the speed limits should reduce those crash numbers. Contact me if you have any areas of concern.

While Gun Safety Awareness month may be over, FWPD would like to remind it's residents to maintain gun safety in their homes by setting a good example.

- Weapons are to remain unloaded and locked in a secure place & inaccessible to children
- Ammunition should be stored separately
- Teach your child it is never okay to play with weapons
- Enroll your child in an age-related gun safety course
- When at a friend's house child is to follow same gun safety rules

Weapons and Vehicles

Never store loaded or unloaded weapons inside an unoccupied vehicle. Responsible gun owners should remove weapons from vehicles for proper storage. City wide, vehicles are being broken into. Do not provide a criminal with a weapon that could be used to commit a more serious crime.

Recently Fort Worth Police NPOs provided goody bags to 250 families at a local outlet mall. Each goody bag contained 1 gun cable lock along with additional safety tools to be utilized around the home. NPO's goal is to assist families remain safe at all times especially in the homes.

Reduce risks of having your child contacted by cyberbullies, predators, etc by practicing internet safety measures.

Discuss potential online dangers with your child

Always use care when creating a log-in name. Avoid words that describe you in any way Never use any personal information, birth dates



Children are our greatest assets and also most vulnerable. When online, parents should help children navigate how to properly use the internet by discussing with them the specific risks they may encounter and what to do if they feel threatened in any way.

In this world of technical devices used in schools, homes and businesses, children need to learn how to navigate successfully in the digital environment even if it means there may be some level of risk. With instant messaging tools and social networks being the norm for learning & communicating, todays generation is expected to utilize, create, communicate all while remaining safe with self & personal information.

In education, children should be encouraged to extend their online activities beyond entertainment or just playing games. Tutoring tools, educational aides, online tutorials allow children to better succeed in the classroom. While overseeing, parents should try to develop in their child a sense of technical knowledge and online resilience.

In socializing, children can connect with friends and family members all from the comfort and safety of their home. Some children create blogs, share music and ideas and games. Online usage develops social interactions, whether online or in person. By socializing more actively online children become better at managing their online privacy.

But all this activity does come at a risk. There are ill-intended persons online who target children for the sake of bullying or personal harm.

Children can be exposed to new risks that could lead them to harm such as hate speech or confronted with violent or sexual nature. One way to ensure that online risks do not result in harm to children is to improve guidance on children's internet use for parents and others. Parents should keep the main hub of internet usage in a open space of the home as opposed to a child's bedroom. Speaks of the dangers that are associated with online usage such as cyberbullying or child predators. Be supportive and monitor their new connections. Limit usage when necessary & always be ready to listen. Parents are children's first line of defense online or in person.

An increasing number of senior citizens are targeted by scammers who mimic legitimate groups, businesses, support IT staff, tax accessor, medical provider and most humiliating that of a romantic scammer. Scammers target the elderly because of their vulnerability to succumbing to the scammers tactics. Scammers use fear, intimidation, lack of knowledge/understand or just plain loneliness in order to acquire personal information, bank or credit card information and most often money transfers. Why are senior citizens most targeted?

- Larger financial savings amounts
- Are trusting
- Lonely and just want someone to speak to
- Have acquired valuables including property
- Often times are too embarrassed to report a theft of this type
- Lack of family members

What Types of Scams are Targeting Seniors

Listed are just a small example of the types of scams reported to the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) Report scams to the FTC at ReportFraud.ftc.gov Emails, FB profiles and phone calls continue to be the #1 methods used by scammers to reach their victims.

Investment Scams: Who doesn't want to increase their financial footprint? Senior citizens oftentimes worry that they may outlive their savings. Scammers use correct terminology & stage false testimonies from false customers in order to convince the victim to invest money in a fraudulent business scheme. Victims are promised large sums of risk-free monetary returns.

Charity Scams: Scammers use emotional pleas to trick victims into giving money.

Lottery Scams: Victims are told that they have won a large sum of money or a new vehicle. In order to receive their "winnings" first they must send a quoted amount in order to assist with the transfer of funds or delivery of the vehicle. Scammers may request victim to provide bank account or other personal information in order to "collect".



Tech Support Scams: Victims are contacted by what seems a legitimate source who has noticed a problem on a device and needs the victim to download software in order to repair. Victims fall prey to fake pop-ups resembling error messages such as ***COMPUTER SCAM ALERT***

Emergency Assistance Scams: Whenever there is a natural catastrophe such as Hurricane Idalia remember that knowing the full scale of damages can take weeks or months after so be slow in giving money. When giving money donations use vetted non-profit local agencies.


